- There is a \$10 charge for each children's vaccine • There is no charge if unable to pay.
- Children must be accompanied by a parent/legal guardian or another adult with written permission from the parent.
- The Health Department participates in the federally-funded "Vaccines For Children" program.
- Neighborhood Clinics are funded by local tax levy dollars and grants from the Ohio Department of Health.
- Adult vaccine available (costs will vary by vaccine): Hepatitis A & B, Tetanus, MMR, Tdap and Pneumonia.

2010 Recommendations for Adults (19 and Older)*

Vaccine	Who	When/Dosage
Influenza (flu)	All persons wanting to reduce the likelihood of becoming ill with influenza or of spreading it to others	Once a year in the fall
PPV (Pneumonia polysaccharide)	Persons age 65 years or older Persons with chronic risk factors (2 vaccine doses per lifetime)	1-time dose Booster 5 years after 1st dose
Hep B (Hepatitis B)	All adults wishing to obtain immunity against hepatitis B virus infection; Persons with chronic risk factors	3 doses are needed
Hep A (Hepatitis A)	All adults wishing to obtain immunity against hepatitis A virus infection; Persons traveling to some foreign countries; Persons with chronic risk factors	2 doses spaced 6 months apart
Td/Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis)	Adults who are previously unvaccinated will need three doses. Booster Tdap for adults recommended once.	3 doses of Td if previously unvaccinated; Booster in 10 years
Meningitis (Menactra)	College freshmen; Persons with chronic risk factors; International travel	1 dose
MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella)	Persons born in 1957 or later who are previously unvaccinated; Persons with chronic risk factors; health care workers	1 or 2 doses are needed
HPV (Human papillomavirus)	All previously unvaccinated women through age 26 years	3 doses are needed
Zostavax (Shingles)	Adults age 60 and older who want to reduce the risk of shingles	1 dose
Varicella (Chickenpox)	Healthcare workers; persons without history of illness	2 doses

*Not all vaccines provided at neighborhood clinics.

Q: What are vaccinations? A: Vaccinations protect you against serious diseases. Most vaccinations are given as a shot. The words "vaccination" and "immunization" mean the same thing.

Q: Are vaccinations safe? A: Yes. Most vaccinations cause only minor side effects such as soreness where the shot was given or a slight fever. Serious reactions are very rare. The risks of the disease are far greater than a vaccination risk.
